**“The Glass Soldier:
the story of an ANZAC in the Great War”
Speaker: Mr Don Farrands**

Mr Don Farrands is a commercial barrister specialising in energy and related litigation at the Melbourne Bar. He is Deputy Chairman of a major manufacturing organisation and Director of a disability services provider.

‘The Glass Soldier’ tells the story of his Grandfather, an artist and stretcher bearer, gassed and blinded in April 1918, at Villers-Bretonneux. Upon his return to Australia, N.H.Ferguson worked as a disabled art teacher at RMIT.

After 50 years of disability, in 1968, by the genius of science, and the gift of providence, Ferguson’s sight was restored. This is a story of adventure, trauma, hope, love and miracles. Copies of ‘The Glass Soldier’, published by Big Sky Publishing in 2017, will be available for purchase at \$35. The royalties all go to the Fred Hollows Foundation.
